Relevance

The AFEC 2024 aimed to align with the overarching theme of APEC 2024: Empower, Include, Grow. By embracing diverse perspectives, the AFEC is instrumental in contributing to a more inclusive and sustainable future of education. This project also contributes to the achievement of the APEC Education Strategy by accelerating innovation, one of its main pillars.

The goals of AFEC align with the HRDWG objectives, which are:

- 1 Develop 21st-century knowledge and skills for all
- ② Integrate human resources development into the global economy; and
- ③ Address the social dimensions of globalization.

Objectives

The project aimed to achieve three primary objectives: (i) to share innovative futureoriented educational policies and practices in the APEC region, (ii) to explore the vision of future education and materialize the ideal model of future schools, and (iii) to draw recommendations for shaping better, inclusive, and sustainable future education.

- Introduction of the direction and agenda for the 2025 APEC in Korea and the APEC Education Ministerial Meeting (AEMM)
- The theme of the 2025 APEC Korea: Building a Sustainable Tomorrow Connect, Innovate, Prosper
- Expressions of support and discussion on future collaboration plans for APEC education cooperation projects
- Participants from various APEC economies, including Australia; Indonesia; Malaysia; the Philippines; Chinese Taipei; and Thailand expressed gratitude and support for Korea's APEC education cooperation projects. They highlighted the projects' impact on bridging digital divides, inspiring policy adoption, and fostering regional collaboration. Many voiced hopes for expanded participation and future cooperation. Strong support was also conveyed for Korea's leadership in hosting the 2025 APEC and AEMM, with high expectations for continued success in advancing educational collaboration.

 - Moving from passive learners to agile learners.
 - Shift from degree-focused to professional training.
 - Emphasis on **personalized education**.
 - Development of **alternative education institutions**, such as online learning models, training providers, and corporate education leaders.



Session 1 "Inclusive Education Policies to Bridge the Digital Divide"

- (Indonesia) Ms. Fransisca Nur'aini Khrisna, Coordinator, Education Policy and System Evaluation, Indonesian Ministry of Primary and Secondary Education: Highlighted the "Rapor Pendidikan" platform and Smart Indonesia Programme (PIP) to improve education quality, emphasizing teacher capacity building and reforming evaluation systems.
- (Australia) Ms. Janine Pitt, Counsellor for Education and Research, Australian Embassy, Tokyo, Japan: Discussed expanding education access through digital technologies and establishing an AI ethics framework to create a safe and inclusive learning environment.
- (Korea) Ms. Sumin Yoo, Senior Deputy Director, Korean Ministry of Education: Introduced AI digital textbooks and teacher training initiatives to innovate classrooms while strengthening digital literacy and ethical responsibility education.
- (Thailand) Panthep Larpkesorn, Director of Multilateral Cooperation Unit Bureau of International Cooperation Office of the Permanent Secretary, the Ministry of Education: Addressed challenges of reduced education budgets and digital transformation, exploring new business partnerships as a pathway for educational growth.
- (Japan) Mr. Yasutaka KOMATSUZAKI, Japanese Ministry of Education Culture, Sports, Science and Technology: Shared efforts to close the digital education gap through the GIGA School Initiatives, which provide one device per student and pilot Al-driven schools.

Session 2 "Sustainable Development through Digital Technology: A New Paradigm for Talent Development"



- Speakers discussed strategies for leveraging digital technologies to promote sustainable development. Overall, the presented initiatives aim to balance Al's potential and risks, improve training efficiency, and foster inclusive educational growth within and beyond the APEC region.
- **Mr. Nyi Nyi Thaung, Programme Specialist**, UNESCO Regional Office in Bangkok: Highlighted the balance between the potential and risks of AI, emphasizing equal educational opportunities through digital technology.
- **Mr. Byunghun Yoo**, Associate Manager, Global Training Center, HD Hyundai Global Training Center: Introduced the digital simulators for safe job training and global online learning programs to enhance efficiency.
- **Dr. ZHAO Yuchi**, EDNET Coordinator (2023-2024), APEC HRDWG: Emphasized supporting digital transformation within APEC and fostering inclusive growth through education cooperation and benchmarking initiatives.
- Dr. Prachya Boonkwan, Researcher, National Electronics and Computer Technology Center: Presented five strategies for building an AI ecosystem and strengthening AI education capabilities through the KID-BRIGHT platform.



Session 3 "Educational Innovation and Collaboration in the Digital Age"

- The panel discussion, led by APEC EDNET Coordinator, showcased efforts by Indonesia; Chinese Taipei; UNESCO and SEAMEO INNOTECH to innovate education systems in the digital era. Key strategies included leveraging technology for inclusivity, fostering regional collaboration, and enhancing global understanding of digital education trends.
- Panelists shared insights on addressing challenges and fostering collaboration for education innovation in the digital age
- The moderator emphasized bridging the digital divide and developing sustainable education systems.
- Indonesia highlighted the regional cooperation to **integrate geographic diversity** in education.
- Chinese Taipei stressed enhancing **digital connectivity for all students** and organizing forums to deepen understanding of global digital education trends.
- SEAMEO INNOTECH focuses on **building sustainable learning environments** and achieving **educational equity** through strengthened technological capacity.

- The speakers (ALCoB teachers) shared their know-how and outcomes as the best practices.
- **INA-ROK (Rita/Rahayu/Lee Chang-geun):** Shared examples of online and offline educational and cultural exchanges utilizing digital technology, focusing on multicultural and language learning.
- **PHL-ROK (Ogaya/Jung Ji-young):** Presented practices of strengthening media literacy and student competencies, including an international student web conference.
- MAS-ROK (Zulfadli/Kang Min-hee): Shared examples of organizing an international class week focused on addressing plastic-free and environmental issues.

 2023 MAS (Mohd Adlan): Highlighted that the 2023 workshop in Malaysia introduced participants to various new educational technologies, including Scratch-based coding, cloud computing, generative AI, machine learning, and VR.

- 2023-24 INA (Hwang Hyungjoon, Sinta Dewi Sekarwati): The workshops in Indonesia offered various learning sessions utilizing robotics, block coding, and Scratch. As a result, the participants (INA teachers) applied student-centered EdTech to their schools and shared the outcomes.
- 2023-24 PHL (Ko Kyounguk, Imelda D. Espiritu): The workshop had 3 main goals (Computer-Based-Teaching, Coding, and Culture) The outcomes, impacts, and impressions shared by teachers, as well as the dissemination projects, have been very positive.
- 2024 JPN (Jeong Injae, Kaoru Matsuzaka): Through the onsite workshop in Tokyo, the Korean and Japanese teachers created an exchange plan by the team and actually implemented an international exchange project in their schools.

- APLC (Gong Hoojae): Published a manual for international school exchanges aimed at providing straightforward guidelines for beginners and contributing to sustainable international exchange.
- ASSET (Park Yewon, Kandias Kusnadi, Hwang Chi-sheng): 20 university students from 6 APEC member economies participated in the program from May to September, effectively enhancing their core competencies and 21stcentury entrepreneurship skills. The winning team (Team B) developed their own business plan called 'SEEDU,' an SDG-focused education solution provider.

- As ALCoB members, each panelist shared respective experiences and ideas to improve APEC Education Cooperation Projects (ACE, APEX, ASLP, ASSET) in the future.
- ALCoB Cooperative Exchange program (ACE): Group projects or regular cross-economy brainstorming sessions are suggested to strengthen partnerships and spark more creative ideas. Additionally, providing professional development workshops tailored to teachers' specific needs and improving the online platform would be helpful.
- ALCoB Program for Educators' eXchange (APEX): brings together educators from diverse economies to share best practices, innovative teaching strategies, and cultural insights and reach the professional development of teachers. Learning from others is vital for shaping a resilient and sustainable future.
- APEC School Leadership Program (ASLP): encourages participants to promote international educational cooperation and fosters a transformative mindset.
- APEC Sustainable Social Entrepreneurship Training (ASSET): provides a great opportunity to learn about and implement social enterprises. It also offers networking opportunities for students and serves as a unique experience for their future careers.

Outcomes and Achievements

1. Expansion of Participating Member Economies

In addition to the key member economies that actively engage in the AFEC every year (Indonesia; Malaysia; the Philippines; Chinese Taipei; and Thailand), representatives from the APEC Coordinator (China), Australia; and Japan also attended. They expressed support for the initiative and discussed future cooperation plans. % (SC meeting) 13 participants from 6 economies in 2023 \rightarrow 26 participants from 9 economies in 2024.

2. Sharing the Agenda for 2025 APEC Korea

The Vice Minister of Education introduced the key agenda and goals of the APEC Education Ministerial Meeting (AEMM) in 2025, encouraging active participation and support from member economies.

* Representatives from Australia; Chinese Taipei; and the APEC Coordinator expressed their support for APEC's themes and goals and shared their expectations.

3. Expanding International Cooperation

Following the successful co-hosting with Thailand (the first in six years since the co-hosting with the Philippines in 2018), discussions were held on cohosting with Chinese Taipei in 2026, aiming to strengthen cooperation among member economies.

4. Enhancing Face-to-Face Networking

With the first fully in-person event since the pandemic, the program maximized networking and cooperation opportunities by hosting a variety of panel discussions and presentations by policymakers, international organizations, and educators.

5. Discussing ALCoB's Future Direction

After showcasing best practices from the two-year (2023-2024) initiatives, an ALCoB Talk Concert was held to discuss the future direction of ALCoB activities and explore sustainable cooperation strategies.
